



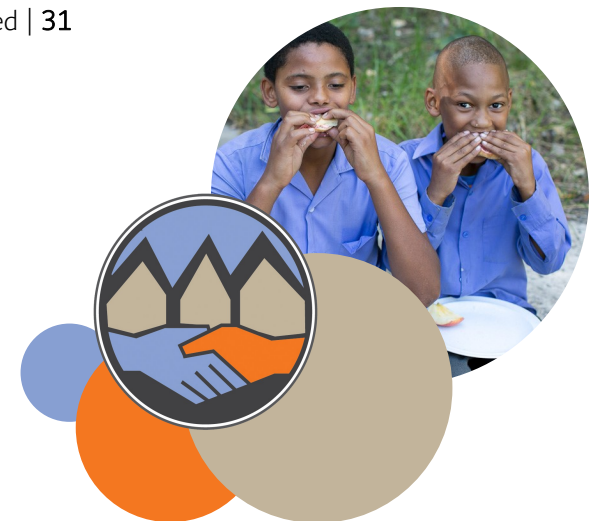

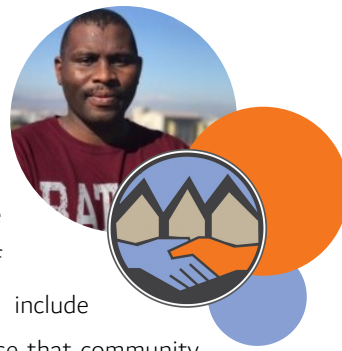
LETTER FROM THE CHAIRPERSON |

In my message to the Prochorus community in 2017, we committed ourselves to focus on building a strong network of volunteers from our partner organisations. Our partner include churches, donors and other individual volunteers. We recognise that community development work can only be done effectively in collaboration with the communities being served and with the partners. I closed the message by stating that, “Prochorus will become an effective tool through which human suffering will be alleviated and communities empowered to realise their full potential”.

In 2018, Prochorus continued to empower communities through Early Childhood Development, Skills Development, Poverty Alleviation and Trauma Counselling. An internship program was piloted in which several youths from Franschoek, Delft and Eersteriver participated. The objective of this program is to develop young community development leaders. Peter Drucker was quoted as saying that; “non-profit organisations, if managed properly, could become the best avenues for meeting human needs and alleviating suffering”. I believe that investing in our capability to continue to realise our objective as an organisation, we need to continue to develop young community leaders with an ability to properly manage non-profit organisations.

The high unemployment rate in South Africa coupled with the lack of accessible and affordable vocational training opportunities creates an opportunity for the Prochorus community to make a bigger impact. Our experience in running successful projects for over two decades can be turned into a platform to create learning and work opportunities for unemployed youths. Prochorus has over the years trained and employed ECD practitioners, Carers, Project managers, Tour guides, Bicycle mechanics, Trauma counsellors, Sports coordinators, Youth coordinators and Computer trainers. This capability needs to be enhanced and deployed in the under-resourced communities in the Western Cape and beyond.

There is a sense that Prochorus is well poised for a leap into the future, a future of greater impact in the under-resourced communities of the Western Cape and beyond. This is certainly not a leap that can be undertaken alone, hence we will continue to build strong relationships with our partners and walk together with them.

In many ways 2018 has been a storm. A lot has taken place, but none of it has been void of the Lords favor and provision for us.

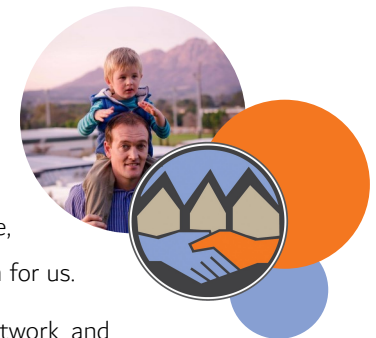

In 2018, Prochorus completed our Viva Network accountability audit, through Connect Networks Quality Improvement Systems program. We have both met all the standards, and been achieved accountability level.

The Meaning off the Viva Quality Mark and QIS Accountability level

QIS Accountability level is a high level of quality and it means that the organisation or project is well on the way towards meeting the international standards referred to in the QIS units.

Achieving a Viva Quality Mark at Accountability level means that the organisation or project is well on the way towards meeting the international standards referred to in the QIS units. An organisation or project must meet all mandatory numbered standards in the standards checklists for all 6 QIS areas, with accompanying evidence.

Mandatory areas have been agreed and signed off by the Quality Standards Reference Group comprising of representatives of World Vision, Tearfund, Compassion, Toybox and Erikshjalpen.

MEET THE TEAM |

YOUTH FORUM |

The Franschhoek Youth Forum started as a culmination of the leaders of 15 youth and community organisations in Franschhoek. They decided to come together and discuss relevant issues, challenges and solutions pertaining to youth development within the Franschhoek valley. The youth forum aims to develop individuals in the forum, by creating development and network opportunities.. The forum actively pursues the mission to champion leaders and foster change in the lives of young people. By striving towards a sustainable cycle of youth development and to standing in unity to maximize our strengths, the forum works towards a greater impact on families, communities and society as a whole.

Through this year the youth forum has successfully organised a youth day event and facilitated leadership programmes in Franschhoek High School and Groendal Secondary. They also facilitated a creative writing workshop at Drakenstein Correctional Facility. The workshop was a combination of inmates from the book club and grade 7 classes from different schools. Not only was it a platform to discover and showcase talent, but throughout the process, it was incredible to see how writing can be an amazing form of expression as well as a method for healing wounds of the past.

MUSIC PROJECT |

The Prochorus Music project presents music lessons (mainly guitar and piano) to impoverished youth from the community. These lessons provide youth with access to resources and positive role models. The classes have the potential to create a sense of identity and hope.

This year the project has trained 6 youth from the Groendal area.

RAPID RELIEF |

Through a partnership between Prochorus and Franco, a Rapid Relief programme was established. The programme stockpiles resources and provides relief to many of the families who suffer due to annual shack fires or floods.

This year has been a busy year for the programme, mainly due to an increased number of shack fires that have taken place. There have been about 6 shack fires throughout the year, and three recently in the space of about a month.

We want to thank Franco for enabling us to have the resources stockpiled in time and ready to go out to those in need on all occasions.

We are happy to have access to relief resources that are immediate. We are one of the first contacts to have resources on the ground to families who have lost almost everything. We would also like to thank Councillor Minnie for her quick communication and getting the numbers to us as soon as possible.

FOOD BAG INITIATIVE |

We are currently providing food bags, which meet basic nutritional needs, to impoverished members of the community.

Further, the aid is accompanied by basic guidance in discipleship and stewardship.

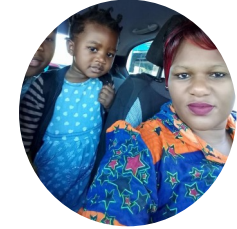

MEET THE TEAM |

ECD CURRICULUM TRAINING |

After an unpredictable start to 2018, we are very pleased with the month of February bringing in the very good news of our Prochorus Early Childhood Development Programme being recognised and registered with the Department of Social Development. The research and writing of this curriculum took many years of planning and assessments. The learning programme was presented to a panel of ECD evaluators in December 2017 and after a gruelling hour of questions and feedback; we were thrilled to receive our registered certificate. Our training in Delft was complete by the end of November 2017, and we celebrated this achievement with a graduation ceremony in March this year. The afternoon was spent reflecting, celebrating and enjoying time together as educators.

This year has seen progress and planning towards an effective training regime for Principals and teachers, who are in the process of registering their crèches. The New Year will bring in 2 training schedules.

Our greatest challenge with regards to Curriculum Training is mentoring and evaluation. This process requires both manpower and time. The effective implementation of a learning programme is determined by the time spent with the Principals and teachers, through guiding, mentoring and encouraging. Both Little Builders Playgroup in Cloeteville and Siyanda Playgroup in Kayamandi, have achieved excellence in implementing the learning programme. We are very proud of them and they have been awarded the official Curriculum Registration Certificate.

As the year closes, we look forward to 2019 and wish to thank all our donors for their faithful generosity in enabling the Curriculum Programme to reach other communities and in so doing empower the young beneficiaries with the powerful tool of Education.

PROJECTS |

UNAKHO |

Unakho is our day-care centre for differently abled children in Kayamandi. The centre started in 2009 and since then has strived to create a safe place for children who don't have a place in other schools. This year Unakho hosted 12 children with a variety of disabilities, including Cerebral Palsy, Autism, Down syndrome, and blindness. We strive to provide the children with the best possible care and teaching.

Cynthia and Khanyisa, teachers at Unakho, receive regular training from the CSPID team from the Western Cape forum for intellectual disabilities and Senecio. Both organisations specialise in working with children with disabilities. This training is also spread to the parents of the learners to best equip them to assist their children.

Cynthia and Khanyisa both have an extreme passion for their children – and it is seen in their absolute dedication to the development of their learners.

Reach: 12 World Changers

SIYANDA PLAYGROUP |

Siyanda is Prochorus' crèche in Kayamandi. The crèche aims to create an educationally safe environment for children, whose parents are unemployed, between the ages of 3 – 5 years old. The crèche runs daily and provides structured Early Childhood Development. Further, the crèche provides two meals and two snacks for each child.

This year 24 children attended Siyanda of which 14 graduated to move on to Gr R in 2019. The teachers did an amazing job to take initiative in all aspects of teaching, cooking, cleaning and administration. Siyanda playgroup is in the final stages of registration at the Department of Social Development to become a registered Early Childhood Development Centre.

The relationship between the parents and the teachers was one of our biggest success stories for 2018. The parents were very involved and attended the parent meetings every quarter. We have strived for their involvement over the past few years.

The crèche teachers focused on outings this year, to broaden their exposure to new experiences. The highlight was the V & A Aquarium, which they absolutely loved. The passion of the staff to impart into the children is the heart of the project, and we have seen great success as a result.

LITTLE BUILDERS PLAYGROUP |

Little builder is Prochorus' crèche in Cloeteville. The crèche aims to create an educationally safe environment for children, whose parents are unemployed, between the ages of 3 – 5 years old. The crèche runs daily and provides structured Early Childhood Development. Further, the crèche provides two meals and two snacks for each child.

Little Builders was attended by 30 children in 2018 of which 11 graduated at the end of 2018. They will move on to Gr R in 2019.

A focus on reading, and establishing a culture of reading among the children. To achieve this, the teachers took the children to Cloeteville library once a week.

The teachers also implemented a weekly parenting course for the parents of their learners. Due to the community's challenges, many of the children come out of homes where they are exposed to drug and alcohol abuse and gangsterism. This negatively affects the children, and the teachers strive to walk a road with parents and children, to ensure the best interest of the child is preserved.

Lorraine van Ster, the Principal, is well known in the community of Cloeteville and has recently attended some courses for trauma and rape counselling. She has also started to do some counselling in the community.

We are grateful for the staffs passion and commitment to the community, as it positively impacts the lives of our beneficiaries.

JONKERSHOEK CYCLING PROJECT |

The Jonkershoek Cycling project celebrates our 7th year in existence. The aim of this project is to teach youth and children at risk, life skills through sport and cycling. We aim to build relationships and mentor the beneficiaries so that they will be able to make sound decisions that will influence their future, and create opportunities for their development.

The cycling project was attended on average by 30 children and youth in 2018. During the winter months, the beneficiaries participate in the soccer season. However, as soon as the rainy and soccer season ends, the children return to cycling. There is a dual focus on cycling and academics. The cycling beneficiaries have to attend the Aftercare project to ensure sustained academic improvement.

The theme for 2018 was, “what we put in is what we get out”. The children were encouraged to train hard, but also to enjoy cycling and natural wonder of Jonkershoek.

The mentoring aspect of the project tackled nutrition, smoking, drugs and drinking. We taught them about the right kinds of food one needs to eat as well as the negative effects that smoking, drugs and drinking have on your mental, physical and emotional health.

The children took part in several cycling and other sporting events this year. Some of them include the Xterra Triathlon, Cape Town Argus Cycling Tour, Spur Schools League, STBB MTB Race and the Origin of Trails.

The project also focuses on training the local youth – to assist in employability. We have up to now trained four mechanics who have found employment at local bike shops. Further, we involved four of the older boys with the route preparation of our fundraising event, Xhiliraces. Through this, they learned crucial skills in trail building and maintenance which is a growing market in the Western Cape.

JONKERSHOEK EDUCARE CENTRE |

The Jonkershoek Aftercare Centre creates a safe space for the children and youth of Jonkershoek after school. We aim to assist children with their school work and provide extra support, in the form of mentoring and extra-classes. The hope is that this will bring an improvement in the academic performance of learners. The subject focus for the year was Mathematics, Afrikaans, English and reading proficiency. In 2018 there has been between a 5 -10 % improvement in the learner’s grades.

The parents are also grateful for the after school supervision provided by the centre, while they are at work. The attendance at the centre has increased greatly, seeing between 25 – 30 children each day.

There was also a focus on mentoring groups and teaching the learners' life skills this year. Through this, we have seen some notable behaviour and discipline changes in our most withdrawn and disruptive students. Extramural activities included knitting classes, dancing and singing classes.

The children also initiated a fundraiser to raise funds for their outings at the end of the year. They did a modelling show and raised R 1800.00. It was great to see the children take initiative to organise this event.

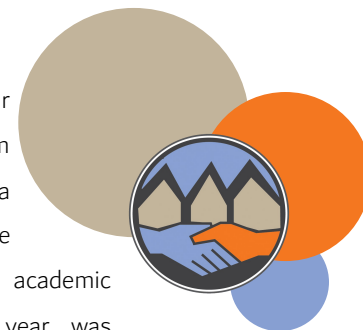
We have been privileged with 5 full-time volunteers who help at the centre on average 1 – 2 days per week. As well as a variety of international volunteers.

The centre has had a successful year, and Lucinda and Monique have done an amazing job at taking the learners from where they are, to where they can be.

SUPPORT-A-CHILD PROJECT |

Although school fees have been abolished since 2007, most families in Kayamandi cannot afford basic required materials such as books, uniforms, stationery and money for school educational trips.



Through a sponsorship programme, individual donors can provide financial assistance for child/children where educational needs are taken care of for a period of time. The Prochorus office manages these funds and distributes the resources accordingly.

Through this project, Prochorus aims to assist learners at risk and their families to exercise their right to learn and finish school. We aim to assist learners to improve their marks at school and we encourage them to perform to their full potential. Their school reports are submitted quarterly. We are committed to preparing scholars for University by walking the road with them during their school years

In 2018 we have purchased school uniforms and stationery for 10 school children at risk in the community. Two of them are completing their matric this year, and therefore their final year in the project. One learner is going to study BCom Law at either Durban University of Technology (DUT) or Tshwane University of Technology (TUT) next year. Another one of our beneficiaries achieved several awards at the school's annual prize giving, one of which was the overall top achiever in grade 9.

In building relationships with the school and teachers of each child, and being an extra support to the children since most of them they don't stay with their parents, we've observed the children grow in confidence. We have also seen an increase in the academic performance of each beneficiary – and are excited to see to see their final reports.

RAPE & TRAUMA COUNSELLING PROJECT |

Rape in Kayamandi is one of the factors affecting the community adversely. Prochorus is currently providing counselling for the raped and abused women and children. The aim is to reach the community and make them aware of how to protect themselves from abuse, as well as teach rape prevention skills in local schools to empower children to protect themselves.

In 2018, we dealt with 30 cases as at 7 November. This included 12 rape cases, 7 domestic violence, 4 trauma counselling and 7 were for grief counselling.

Rape survivors were assisted to report and open cases at the police station. In five of these cases the perpetrators were successfully arrested and are still attending court. In the case of domestic violence, we assist by getting involved and counselling both partners in dealing with the underlying issues and peace in the homes being restored.

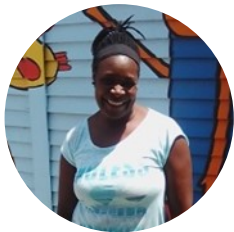

MEET THE TEAM |

SPRING OF LIFE CRECHE |

Spring of Life is an Early Childhood Development centre on the premises of Shofar Stable Ministries. They provide children of the community with the necessary school resources to enable them to be school ready as well as equipping them emotionally, spiritually and intellectually. The children come from three major ethnic groups, namely; Xhosa from South Africa, Shona from Zimbabwe and Tsonga from Malawi.

This year's aims included much-needed maintenance on the crèche buildings, and we're so happy with the mini 'makeover' that JAM International did for us in October. The renovations have assisted in our ongoing journey of getting Spring of Life registered with the Department of Social Development. They not only did the maintenance but donated a new building, providing an extra multifunctional classroom and a full kitchen. Earlier in the year, the BSG school from Memmingen helped us build ablution facilities for our crèche.

Spring of life has truly been a lighthouse for the community and has been somewhat of a terminal for a variety of cultures, races and socio-economic backgrounds to meet.

BOOKS OF LIFE

Books of life is a tutoring programme in the Asanda village area. There are four teachers tutoring 12 children, with a focus on two Grade 12 pupils, helping them to prepare for their final exams. This takes place every second Saturday at the Zola church building of Shofar Stable Ministries. There is also playtime with the younger children. Rani recruits her own teachers from friends and through Somerset West church networking

The aim was to help children of the community improve their academic performance.

STORE HOUSE |

Store House project is the heart of Prochorus, distributing resources collected from the network in which we operate, to people who have a need. The project collaborates with like-minded organisations towards a better, empowered community. We have assisted over 50 households in 2018 and partnered with various organisations in the surrounding area. These organisations include: Shofar Christian Church, Connect Network, Bridging Abilities, ChangeAbility, Helderberg Rape Crisis Centre, Kingdom Kids, Helderberg Street People Centre, SW Night Shelter, Helderberg Development Centre.

The Store House has been a very effective part of our branch, in as far as being the go-to for donations from our church community as well as knowing the need in the community, thus distributing efficiently. Our goal is also to function as a networking organisation between other NGO's and connecting people in need, with the right organisation. From our recent successes especially individuals who struggle recovering from injuries/setbacks in their lives, even in areas as far as Mfulweni, and connecting private donors with them, we can deduce that we are making a difference, using 'our power to empower'.

TRAINING PROGRAMME AND RESOURCE CENTRE |

Partnering with Amazing Brainz, Prochorus Delft will be training and evaluating a group of 80 crèche teachers from over 20 crèches in the Delft community. The curriculum is designed to equip the teachers and provide them with the resources they need to run successful crèches and move one step closer to registering with the Department of Social Development (DSD).

Looking to the future, the desire is to open the training up to as many teachers in the community as possible. The heart is to upskill and empower the teachers who will be teaching the next generation.

The first cycle started in September, and will run until June 2019, after which all the crèches involved will undergo monitoring, evaluation and mentoring, before receiving their Amazing Brainz curriculum certificate.

RESOURCE CENTRE ON MAIN |

Prochorus Delft has a dream of building a high quality training facility to support established crèches in the Delft community through curriculum development and practical support.

The vision is to build a centre as a resource to the community. The heart is to be a hub of resource and training for these community leaders, and take the impact further.

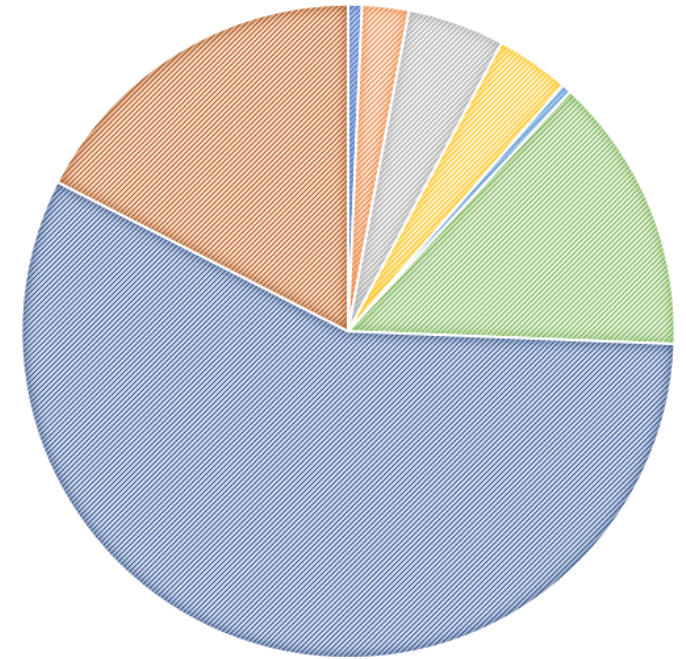
More than this, the resource centre and training hopes to bridge the divide between those who have and those who need. Being connected with Shofar Durbanville and Shofar Delft, the congregation has made their expertise, skills and time available. The hope is to bring two communities together to contribute to safe, high quality crèches within the community.

Currently the land has been bought, and the plans submitted. The Prochorus Delft team are working tirelessly to re-zone and are awaiting the approval of their plans, so that they can start seeing the dream become a reality.

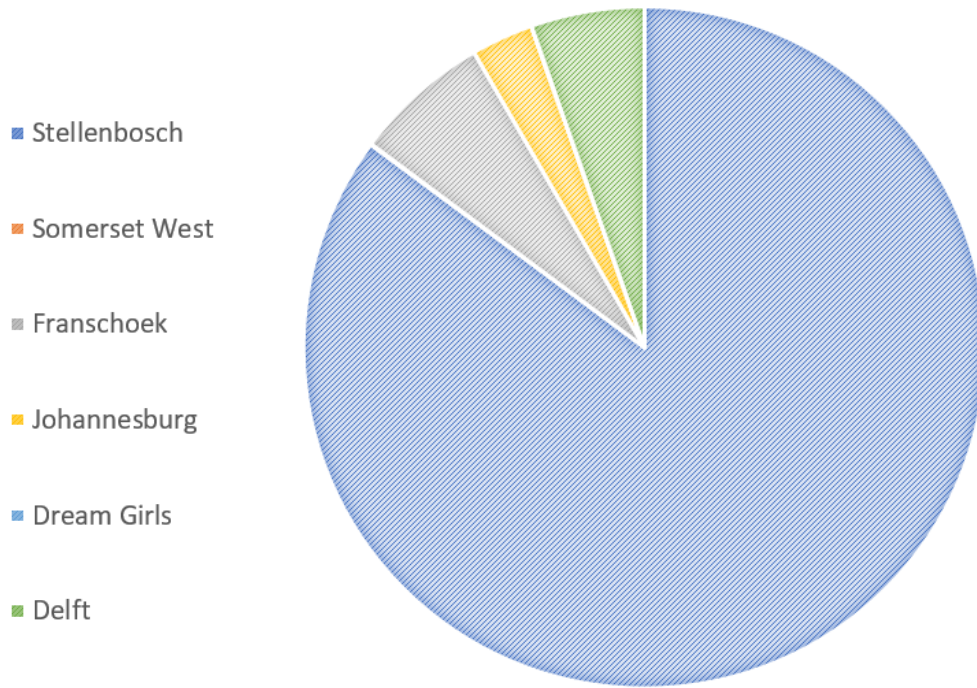
